## Happy Tails

Stories of recent happy adopted endings.

B.J. was one of a litter of 13 puppies. The mother of the litter was a registered golden retriever and the father was a black lab and shepherd mix. Six of the litter were surrendered by the owner to Bond County Humane Society. BCHS received an electronic letter from Jamie in October 2009: "My family adopted B.J. in the summer of 2006 when she was about three months old. Our past dog had passed away a few months previous and we hadn't necessarily planned on adopting another dog so soon. But, when we saw Scooter and the way she looked at us with



her big brown eyes, we knew she belonged in our family. We changed her name to Scooter because B.J. didn't seem to fit her very well and she has the biggest personality in our family. Scooter loves playing with her many, many toys and has a favorite stuffed duck. When anyone isn't happy or feeling well, she will bring her duck to that person and she will drop it on their lap. She loves snuggling but is also constantly active. She loves going for walks and is so well behaved that we can take her to the park without a leash and she won't stray more than five feet away (unless we throw her toy and she'll run after it and bring it right back). She always seems to be smiling, which makes the rest of us smile. She loves going camping and riding in cars and does so whenever possible. She greets everybody in the family every time they come home as though they had been gone for months. Her tail wags like crazy and she'll sit there letting you scratch her for hours."



Lazarus is a grey and black striped tabby cat. Lazarus was brought to BCHS by a woman who found him under her deck. She heard his cries over the sound of their lawnmower. Lazarus seemed lifeless when she brought him in. He was severely dehydrated and it was unsure whether he would survive. With the help of a lot of warmth and fluids, within an hour after he arrived he was showing some signs of life. Lazarus today is a healthy playful kitten who loves to play with dogs. His favorite playmates while fostered with BCHS were an 85 pound Alaskan Malamute and an 8 month old Lab mix puppy. Within a week or so of our putting his adoption profile online, the 15 week old Lazarus quickly found his new forever home.

## **Announcements and News**

### **Lemonade Generosity**

Two Greenville sisters and their friends sold cool cups of lemonade to refresh customers near their home in the summer heat of August 2009. The girls donated their entire lemonade stand proceeds to Bond County Humane Society. We are so thrilled to thank the enterprising and bighearted Hope and Heidi Summers and their friends Andrea and Emma for thinking of BCHS and the cats and dogs in our care.

### **Red-Tailed Hawk Rescue**



On October 15, a pickup truck driver hit an animal while driving on I-70. The driver immediately pulled to the side of the road to discover an immature red-tailed hawk attached to his vehicle's grill! He pulled it out and brought the hawk to Bond County Humane Society. A BCHS volunteer contacted TreeHouse Wildlife Center in Brighton, Illinois and Dennis Hundsdorfer transported the injured hawk to their facility for care. Clinicians there initially determined the hawk suffered only from a dislocated wing joint and the stress of the ordeal. BCHS followed up a week later and learned that after more tests, the hawk was found to have a fractured shoulder socket but it should certainly fly again someday. The hawk will be monitored closely

while it heals and then released back into its natural habitat. We received another update with a photo from TreeHouse Wildlife Center on December 9. They report: "It's hard to get him to stand still for long. Prognosis right now looks good. He will be going into a larger flight cage soon."

### **Decrease In Adult Cat Adoption Fees**

In an effort to increase adoptions in these hard economic times for both the shelter and the community, Bond County Humane Society has implemented a new adoption strategy for adult cats. The adoption fee for cats one year old or more that have been in the shelter for at least 30 days has been reduced from \$90 to \$50. The adoption fee for younger cats and kittens remains \$90.

### **Pound For Pound**

Buchheit in Greenville held a month long "Pound for Pound" drive in August for Bond County Humane Society. During the drive the store sold \$1 and \$5 paper paws. Buchheit matched the customer donations and supplied BCHS with over \$500 in Pro Plan Puppy food. Matt Seabaugh, Buchheit store manager, delivered the food and two BCHS officers, Rachel Hundsdorfer and Nancy Machmer, were present to accept the delivery and thank Buchheit for their generous support.



### **Companion Animal Response Education Team**

In March 2009, BCHS was invited to join forces with several other no-kill Metro-East shelters to form an organization focused on educating children about the needs of companion animals and proper care. The group calls itself Companion Animal Response Education Team (or CARE). The members come from various backgrounds and locations including Glen Carbon, Collinsville, Alton, Edwardsville, Granite City, Troy, Alhambra and of course Greenville. The group is organized into multiple teams. Member teams have developed appropriate presentation material and hand-outs for different age groups: Kindergarten through Grade 2, Grades 3 through 5, Grades 6 through 8, and High School. BCHS is part of the Grades 6-8 group team but will be called upon to also give presentations at the two other levels within Bond County and possibly other districts. CARE is currently working with school districts to obtain necessary approvals and will then begin setting up schedules. Actual presentations will start after the Holidays, during the Pennies For Puppies drive in March 2010. Anyone experienced in education and interested in helping with the presentations should contact the BCHS office for details.



### **Paws For Thought - A letter from the editor**

I live in a typical Greenville neighborhood, in a single family home near district schools and churches. Each day, a disheveled orange and white tomcat traverses his territory which includes my block. He pauses to dig into my garden for a litter box before marking my neighbor's ornamental bush. Later that day I know I can find him dozing in the sunny yard of a house on the street behind mine. A few houses down, a tortoiseshell cat with white feet and face spends a good part of her day patiently waiting on the porch where her people set out stainless steel bowls of food and water for her. A short walk away, I can depend on passing a pure white cat either loafing on its small porch or stalking me across its small yard full of shrubbery near a city sidewalk and a well travelled avenue. These animals are just a few of the many seemingly content, outdoor roaming kitties. But often they are fearful, dirty, wet and vulnerable to traffic, dogs and wild beasts (raccoons, skunks, foxes, groundhogs, snakes, and birds), even pet-nappers! My heart goes out to these animals and I struggle with my conflicting desires to educate their owners and to mind my own business.

### **Pets For Seniors**

BCHS offers special adoption discounts for seniors 60 years or older. Senior adopters receive a \$50 discount off of adoption fees. This discount is made available through the Purina Pets For Seniors Program. Standard adoption fees usually start from \$90 for cats and \$100 for dogs and include veterinary testing and treatment, routine shots, alteration and state-mandated micro-chipping.

### **Plus!**

Cats at least one year old are now offered at the reduced adoption fee of \$50. Our pictured available animals below qualify for this reduced fee!

**Precious** is a tortoiseshell colored domestic long hair cat approximately 4 ½ years old. She has a notch in her right ear because initially she was a free roaming cat. Normal operating procedure at the time was to notch the right ear to denote the cat has been spayed/neutered. Precious was taken in the house by a homeowner for several years. The owner surrendered her because they had to move and could not take Precious with them. Precious is very timid, mild mannered and loving. She doesn't like loud noises or a lot of activity. The ideal home for Precious would be quiet with adults.



**Aurora** is a lovely grey tabby domestic short hair cat approximately 1 ½ years old. She was a stray that came to BCHS with her six kittens. When her kittens were weaned she became a surrogate mom for a 1 week old kitten that was brought into BCHS. Aurora is sociable, mild mannered and likes to be held and petted. She gets along well with other cats. Some of her kittens are also available for adoption.
