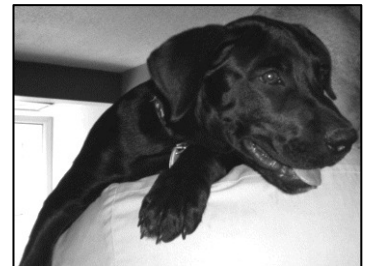

## Happy Tails

Stories of recent happy adopted endings

**Cody** and his litter mates, Cammie and Chester, are Terrier/Labrador Retriever mix puppies who were taken to a home by their mother before she disappeared. The residents of the home contacted BCHS and agreed to foster the 3 puppies until they could be adopted by other families. When Cody was 14 weeks old, he was adopted and went to live in his forever home.



His new family sent this message in November 2010: "Hi, all at Bond County Humane Society! We got Cody at PetSmart in Edwardsville in August. I just wanted to share some more pictures! He is getting so big! He is spoiled rotten and just graduated from a 6 week puppy training

class. He does really well except for 'stay.' He gets excited and can't really seem to do that one very well. He has totally made himself at home here, and we all just love him dearly! He is already weighing 49 pounds. Regardless of that fact, I'm pretty sure he thinks he's a lapdog. Just wanted to let you know how happy he is - and we are that we got him! -Tom, Linda, Andy, Holly, Maddie, AJ and Cody Quigley."

**Rudy** was rescued by BCHS when he was four months old. His owners had abandoned him and his three brothers and sister at a campground. They were living under a camper when BCHS came and got the Labrador/Shepherd mix puppies. They did not get all the socialization they should have when they were little puppies so Rudy was very scared of new people and new places. Going to busy and confusing adoption day events was not fun for him but he enjoyed the patient, one-on-one attention with volunteers back at the BCHS dog kennel. He loved to play with his brother Prancer, especially games involving the water hose. Then one wonderful September 2010 day, a family with a dog who looked as if he could be Rudy's twin came to an adoption day to meet him. The two dogs got along great; the family was eager to work on lessening Rudy's social fears and they promised to love him forever.



This is an email they sent soon after they adopted him: "Dear Rachel, I wanted to write you and give you an update on how Rudy is doing. I know that you and your husband love him and miss him very much, and that you would appreciate such information. Rudy is doing much better. He really enjoys being with Bo and the two of them have been playing together. Tails are up and wagging. Bo has truly made a HUGE difference in helping him adjust to his new environment and his new people. He loves going for walks with Bo around the neighborhood. Bo has been even sharing his bone with him. The two of them are like two peas in a pod. You may be happy to know that Rudy does not hide in his crate. In fact, this morning when I opened the crate he came out happy and wagging his tail. He does have a lot of fear and if a situation arises that he is not comfortable with, such as a noisy lawnmower or kids, he starts shaking and foaming from the mouth. We take him inside the house during such times, so that he may calm down. It was a tough trip home for him [the afternoon of the adoption], but by evening he was comfortable enough to sleep in Bo's bed. I want to assure you that Rudy is a very lucky dog. He has found a good home and he is and will be taken care of as one of our own. I truly appreciate your help in adding this new member to our family. Sincerely, Anatoly & Carolyn."

Bond County Humane Society was honored to be selected as a recipient of one of six Greenville Women's Club awards for contributions to the community at their annual ceremony on the Courthouse Lawn October 2, 2010 during Apple Day. Kay Anna Warthen, BCHS Vice-President of Feline Wellness, was selected by the BCHS officers to accept the Service Award plaque. Other BCHS members spotted in the crowd included VP of Membership Nancy Machmer and Fundraising Committee Volunteer Gayle Wise, who had joined together as fellow GWC members to nominate the Humane Society to join the other deserving recipients. In notifying Rachel Hundsdorfer, co-founder and first president of BCHS, Jerri Davenport of the Greenville Women's Club highlighted the group's contributions of "providing shelter to the unwanted pet populations of the Bond County area, as well as promoting community awareness on the humane treatment of animals." Other awards for

contributions to the community included Hometown Pride Awards to Sweetest Things and Frank Snyder Financial Services, Special Service Award to Bradford National Bank, and Barb Smith as Outstanding GWC member. The Simple Room also received a Service Award.

### Quarter Raffle Designates BCHS As Their Greenville Event's Charity Organization

Organizers of the Quarter Raffle held at Cunetto's Restaurant in Greenville Thursday, November 4, 2010, invited Bond County Humane Society to serve as their designated charity. Guests who brought an item to be donated to BCHS (food, toys, litter, office and cleaning supplies, etc) received an additional bidding paddle for free. ### Microchipping Works!

"With microchipping there is a good chance of reuniting a pet with its family."

"A microchip will save your pet from euthanization when she goes missing."

This year a cat in Delaware was returned to his owner after being missing for more than a year because the associate who found him outside her store took him to the local SPCA who immediately scanned the cat for a microchip. The amazed and thankful owner was contacted by phone right away. Owner and cat were reunited that same day. Bond County Humane Society scans all surrendered and found animals to see if they are chipped before making a decision about how to file a report. By Illinois state law and BCHS policy, all of our adoptable pets are implanted with the tiny microchip before going to their new homes, and the chip registration is transferred to the new owners. And for pet owners who have not adopted their furry family members from us, we offer a year-round \$15 microchip implant opportunity, plus we sponsor a microchipping clinic each year at Paws In The Park.

presentation on behalf of BCHS with support from Dennis and Dexter (an adoption dog). Dexter was the first dog BCHS ever took to church and he was a big hit. He was well-behaved but perked up at the singing and piano music – no, he didn't sing along. And incidentally (through the power of prayer?), Dexter was chosen by a family for adoption the very next weekend! Snacks and beverages (including "puppy chow" cereal candy snacks) were served after the meeting and BCHS was presented the entire donation of \$136 collected during the worship service. Thanks to the group for their interest and support. In a related story, Mt. Gilead pastor Melissa Goodloe and her family recently adopted a kitten from BCHS. Bingo – renamed Jubilee – is adjusting jubilantly in her new home.

### **Red Tailed Hawk Rescue Update**

A previous issue of The Pet Dispatch detailed the story of the rescue and medical treatment of an injured red tailed hawk that had been in a collision with a vehicle in autumn of 2009. It was through the joint efforts of BCHS and Treehouse Wildlife Center that the hawk was quickly placed with animal experts who could help. Now, in a joyous conclusion to the hawk's story, his damaged wing was repaired, he was fully rehabilitated and released back into his natural habitat on June 23, 2010. Treehouse volunteer handler Andrea Crabtree brought the handsome hawk by the BCHS office for a quick visit before setting him free within Patriot's Park north of Greenville. The message most central in this story and update is that animal lovers everywhere can and do make a difference locally, which contributes to a global impact of conservation. The truck driver could have left the mangled bird on the side of the interstate to die, either by his direct injuries or due to his inability to hunt food. But the driver believed that the bird of prey was worth saving. The driver knew who to call and BCHS knew who to call next. The bird's life and future were saved. Many birds (hawks, eagles, owls, etc) and other wildlife are saved in this manner: because of common, caring people like you. This is another positive reason why we all do what we do!

### **Pet Oxygen Masks Update**

As reported in the Summer 2010 Pet Dispatch, through the generosity of donated funds by Mark and Lori File and Dale and Ann Smith, BCHS has been able to purchase additional pet oxygen recovery masks for use by Bond County first responder units needing to give respiratory first aid to dogs and cats in emergencies. These newest mask kits went to Mulberry Grove Fire Protection District and to Smithboro Fire Protection District. With these latest donations and presentations, this leaves only the Bond County FPDs of Shoal Creek-Sorento and Keesport yet to be offered pet oxygen mask equipment.

### **BCHS Low Cost Spay/Neuter Programs**

### **Hot Summer Days Benefit BCHS**

Many hungry people braved the heat on Friday, July 23, 2010, to grab lunch at BCHS's BBQ Cookout held at the Greenville IGA grocery store. Meats grilled over open flames included pork steaks, pork burgers, pork tenderloins, rib eyes on buns, hot dogs and brats. Between August 4-10, BCHS volunteers worked the Bond County Fair carnival ticket booth. Our math and change-making was so exact that the money came out perfect two nights in a row! Then Dennis Hundsdorfer and his dog Ben drove the BCHS van through the fair's parade for a second year in a row. Kids could be heard shouting along the route: "HEY, I know that dog! He came to my school!" referring to the CARE Team programs during the 2009-10 school year. Dennis himself overheard many people saying: "I know that dog from last year's parade." Ben sure loves the crowds. And BCHS loves your community recognition and support.

### **7th Annual Paws In The Park: Encounters Of The Four Legged Kind**

Paws In The Park is always Bond County Humane Society's most ambitious and also most rewarding fundraiser. This year, the Saturday September 11<sup>th</sup> event began a tad soggy and cool but the day remained clear of rain and even turned beautiful as afternoon arrived. Pastor Shalom Renner gave group and individual  **blessings of the animals**  before the festivities went ahead. BCHS



welcomed the **K9 Racers**, a fly ball relay team from St Charles, MO, who gave fast-paced demonstrations of their sport. Their energetic pups raced down a short grass track, leapt hurdles, grabbed a tennis ball from a spring loaded box, and raced back to the starting line allowing the next dog on the four dog team to start his leg of the relay race. **St Louis Metropolitan Police K-9 Unit** Officer Larry Wilke and his German Shepherd partner Damon demonstrated how their valuable team conducts searching and tracking exercises. The well-trained K9 successfully located a 'lost' boy in the park and discovered a controlled sample of explosive material hidden inside a vehicle's wheel.

A '**Dogs In Art**' tent created by art teacher Signe Matute offered entertainment for both adults and kids. She created a display of posters featuring - what else? - dogs in art from all eras of history and in all styles of artistic medium and expression. She encouraged younger Paws In The Park attendees to sketch pictures of their pets using the provided markers, crayons, paper and drawing boards. Pet Designs, a Certified Groomer outfit in Bond County, kept themselves very busy under their tent performing **Nail Trimming and Nail Decorating** for dogs who wanted their paws to look and feel their best. All day long each customer was only charged a donation to BCHS. A **Microchipping Clinic** was on hand in the afternoon with two veterinary care workers implanting the tiny identification chips. This simple, painless procedure for pets lasts a lifetime and is the best chance a pet has of returning to his or her owner after going missing. Every animal BCHS adopts out is already equipped with one.



**Pet Portraits** were conducted by pro photographer David Ulmer and his assistant for the day Deb Hilling, both repeat BCHS volunteers. Roving event photographer David Schubert captured Candid and Awards Snapshots. Gayle Wise and her team of helpers created **Personalized Paw Prints** out of modeling clay, paper and paint. Calligraphy artist Robin Briggs drew each dog's name beside the colorful, one-of-a-kind paper paw print creations. **Hot Diggety Dog Concessions** provided their food service trailer again in 2010. A percentage of their sales all concession season long are also donated to BCHS.

Early arrivals to the park participated in the **Wag-N-Walk** event this year, the dogs and walkers taking a morning excursion along the trail around the lake. Dan and Mignon Fetterhoff, the top 2010 Wag-N-Walkers, raised \$600 in total pledges and were awarded a digital camera. Debbie Blankenship, runner-up, collected \$200 in total pledges and won a digital music player. An **Agility Course** was offered for dogs of all shapes and sizes to run, jump and crawl through. In competitive dog agility, a dog is expected to navigate an obstacle course via a handler's verbal and body signals only, but at Paws In The Park, Jackie Gruner and her team of assistant handlers allowed the participating dogs to be led by leash when necessary. Fun, laughter and the experience of completing the full agility course is often more important than rules.

**Pet Contests:** Perhaps it was the threat of more rain that thinned the crowd from 2009's numbers but a crowd it still was in 2010. And the slight decrease in the number of pet contest entries only increased the odds of winning for those lucky pooches and handlers present. Hershey Kisses, a long-haired Dachshund shown by Janice Perkins; Lucy, a Standard Poodle shown by Maranda Schaefer; Europa, a Labrador shown by Anastasia Baird; Ringo, a large mixed breed pup shown by Samantha Green; and Cotton and Drake, two dogs shown by Kayla Green and Yvonne Green,



dominated in participation for another year in 2010. And each of these dogs barked away with a trophy or ribbon in an event as well. Fastest fetch contestants felt the pressure and many were hard pressed to perform as well as they had in earlier practices. But we had many great Kissers and Barker-Howlers this year. Best Tricks categories showcased incredibly diverse doggie talents.

New event categories divided up the sizes of dogs better in contests for Prettiest Pure Breed and

Prettiest Mixed Breed. Paws planners created 3 events instead of the previous years' 2: Large, Medium, and Small. Paws attendees were encouraged to vote for their choice in the **Cutest Pet Photo Contest**. By the end of the day, Brenda Hess's photo entry of a cigar-smoking Dachshund had raised the most votes of donation money and she received the contest trophy. Christina Scott's photo of a kitten sleeping on a small soccer ball garnered the second most votes.

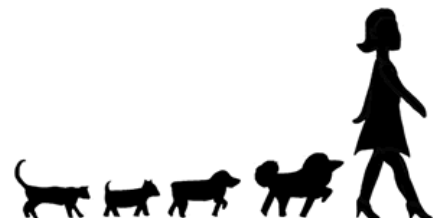
I sincerely appreciate all the personal donations in time and money that have been made to help stray, homeless and unwanted animals.

Fourth Street in Greenville, at the Petco store in Fairview Heights on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays and at the PetSmart store in Glen Carbon on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Saturdays of the month. Also our brand new Sponsor-A-Pet program is getting underway. Now you can choose an adult dog or cat living in BCHS care and sponsor them with a donation each month. Standard adoption fees range from \$60 (for cats older than one year) up to \$125 for young dogs and include veterinary testing and treatment, routine shots, alteration and state-mandated micro-chipping.



**Boots** is a medium-to-large size, adult, domestic short hair cat with a black and white coat. He is the purrfect gentleman, dressed up in his "tuxedo" fur coloring pattern. A kind person found a litter of kittens born in their garage and brought them in to BCHS, and Boots was one of these kittens. He is now approximately 2 years old. Boots is a really curious and responsive guy, liking to play, especially with small soft balls, fleece strings and feather teaser wands. He is not sure if he likes to sit on laps, but he tolerates being held and is known to snuggle the legs and arms of people he trusts. Boots gets along well with most other cats. We don't know

how he gets along with dogs. Boots would love to become a permanent member of your family.
