Stories of recent happy adopted endings.

Caesar and his six litter mates, a mix of Dachshund and Chesapeake Bay Retriever, were from an unwanted litter surrendered to Bond County Humane Society by their owners when they were almost 7 weeks old. Caesar was adopted when he was approximately 12 weeks old. BCHS received an electronic



letter from Caesar's new family in January 2010: "Hello everyone

He's getting bigger by the day and seems to have found his voice. He has his first vet appt next week. Still a little chewer, and we think he might be teething as he is loving the frozen washclothes we give him. He is an absolute joy to have, and brings my fiance and I lots of entertainment and love. We will continue to update you guys as he grows. Thanks again for everything! -Katie and Nathan."



Pearl, a white Domestic Short Hair cat, was between 1 and 2 years old in April 2010. A few months before that, Pearl was surrendered to BCHS by her owner because she did not do well with other pets they brought into the house. With BCHS volunteers and visitors, Pearl was sociable, playful and very affectionate, loving to be petted and have her tummy rubbed. Several potential adoptors applied for Pearl and finally a match was made. In May 2010, her furever family wrote to say: "Pearl wanted me to let you know that all is well here. I wanted to share some of Pearl's photos. She is such a good girl and fits right into our family. She had an ear infection early on, so that meant a trip to the vet right away. The vet said other than the ear, which was treated with some antibiotic ear gel, she is in great shape. In this photo she is looking out onto the deck where there is a bird feeder. We call it cat

TV: the Bird Channel. [When not at the window,] she is sitting with my husband. She rarely leaves any room that he is in, and they have become great buddies. He moved my ottoman over by the window so she can easily lay there to watch her favorite channel. It isn't where it belongs, but if it is for Pearl it is ok. Thank you, again, for letting Pearl come to live with us. She is a jewel and we love her so. -Carla and Jim."

Pet Oxygen Recovery Masks Donated to Greenville and Pocahontas Fire Protection Districts

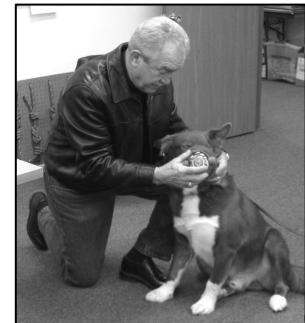
The Greenville Fire Protection District recently received a donation of pet oxygen masks with the help of an anonymous local benefactor and Bond County Humane Society. An article in a recent major newspaper brought out the generosity of an area resident that has donated funding for two sets of animal oxygen recovery masks to give GFPD the ability to provide first aid rescue to dogs and other pets in respiratory distress. Each set of masks comes in three sizes, Large Canine, Small Canine and Feline, but they benefit any animal whose muzzle will fit into the masks.



"Too many pets each year die of smoke asphyxiation. Even if the firemen were able to get pets safely out of the burning structure, they would not be able to revive them without a pet oxygen mask. These cone-shaped masks can be used both on conscious pets that have suffered from smoke inhalation and pets that need to be resuscitated after losing consciousness as a result of their exposure to the dangerous toxic fumes" (from wagn4u.com). In the past, GFPD has had to rely on masks designed for humans to revive animals rescued from fires, drownings and in other respiratory distresses. The department is excited to begin training with these

specially designed pet mask kits.

A presentation ceremony took place the evening of February 4, 2010 at Greenville Fire Department. BCHS Vice President Dennis Hundsdorfer gave Fire Chief Bill Johnston the two donated sets of oxygen masks. Hundsdorfer's canine companion, Ben, helped to demonstrate the lifesaving masks' function. BCHS and Johnston both hope that this publicity can generate enough interest and donations (each mask set is \$65.00) to provide the remainder of Bond County's fire protection districts with similar equipment. Since that first donation, Mark and Lori File and Dale and Ann Smith have donated the funds necessary to buy two more sets! BCHS representative Rachel Hundsdorfer presented Pocahontas-Old Ripley Fire Department the newest mask set on April 15, 2010. An additional two sets are being ordered and will be presented when received.



In addition to the pet oxygen masks, Dennis Hundsdorfer arranged to have ASPCA donate 200 window/door pet rescue decals to be given away to Bond County resident families with inside pets. They are free and can be obtained by stopping by the office located at 1403 South Fourth Street in Greenville.

Area Scouting Troops Look to BCHS to Earn Awards, Badges and Ranks

In Spring 2010, Pocahontas Boy Scouts of Troop 1060 worked on their Pet Care and Dog Care Badges and worked toward their next level of rank by performing community service. They walked dogs in Bond County Humane Society shelter care on Monday evenings. During their initial 10 volunteer hours (6 hours were required and 4 were extra), each of the five Boy Scouts bonded with particular dogs and pups. Troop 1060 may choose to continue their Pet Care activities, participating in BCHS's annual Paws In The Park event in September, entering and showing canine companions in contests. In addition to working directly with dogs, the Boy Scouts' participation included learning about and participating in BCHS's fundraising and advertising efforts. The troop raised \$250 at their school for BCHS.

On March 23, 2010, four girls from Pocahontas Daisy Girl Scout Troop 8802 and two girls from Pocahontas Brownie Girl Scout Troop 8407 delivered a large container of homemade dog treats to the dogs at Bond County Humane Society. The Daisy and Brownie Girl Scouts showed they are considerate and caring by baking the peanut butter dog treats. Based on the response from the dogs, they were very happy with the

Girls Scouts' baking skills. The Girl Scouts sent us a photo scrapbook about their experience, thanking BCHS for hosting their visit and accepting their dog treats. The six girls are pictured below with their donation.



Rescued Chihuahua

On March 1, 2010, a little three pound Chihuahua became separated from her human companions in Greenville and began a struggle to survive on her own. On March 5, 2010, during her lunch break, an employee of Enertech in Greenville spotted the dog walking along Route 40. Because the dog looked thin and disoriented, the woman stopped to help her. The dog came to her right away. The woman made several calls and then contacted Bond County Humane Society. Although the owner had posted missing dog notices, no one seemed able to identify the dog or help her except BCHS. A search of the BCHS log book uncovered the owners' flier and the information was provided to the rescuer. The contact was made and the little dog was returned to her owners. The rescuer was given a \$100 reward but donated it directly to BCHS. Thank you, Julie Oderizzi.

Companion Animal Response Education (CARE) Team Update

On February 22, 2010, representatives of the Bond and Madison counties team, known as CARE (a group featured in the Holiday 2009 Edition of our newsletter), conducted presentations on proper pet care to students at the Greenville Elementary School. Rachel and Dennis Hundsdorfer, along with Cindy Orscheln, presented the program. The educational and fun messages to the two groups of youngsters, aged pre-Kindergarten through 5th grade, were generally well received. Packets of information on caring for happy and healthy dogs and cats were handed out by the CARE team to the students in attendance. Ben, Dennis and Rachel's dog (previously BCHS foster dog), was present and performed some of his tricks. Feedback from the students is that he was a big hit.

CARE team conducted a second program on May 17 at Pocahontas for grades Kindergarten through 8th. 226 students learned about proper pet care from Sandy Eaves and Rachel Hundsdorfer who gave this presentation. Dennis and the dog, Ben, again supported as they had at GES. The Pocahontas class was very attentive and interested in the CARE program. The principal of the school recognized students that volunteer for BCHS and had them stand.

3. Contact your local animal control and file a missing animal report.

4. Contact Countryside Vet Clinic (618-664-4420) and Greenville Vet Clinic (618-664-0640) and file a lost animal report and determine if any found animal matches yours.
5. Make posters/fliers and distribute them.

Pets For Seniors

BCHS offers special adoption discounts for seniors 60 years or older. Senior adopters receive a \$50 discount off of adoption fees. This discount is made available through the Purina Pets For Seniors Program. Standard adoption fees usually start from \$90 for cats and \$100 for dogs and include veterinary testing and treatment, routine shots, alteration and state-mandated micro-chipping.

Cats at least one year old are now offered at the reduced adoption fee of \$60. Our pictured available animals below qualify for this reduced fee!



Kelly is a medium size, adult, domestic long hair cat with bright white and amber orange bi-coloring. His coat is super silky. He was found in the woods by a couple mushroom hunting. Kelly was extremely thin and frail when the couple brought him to BCHS. He is approximately 2 years old. Kelly is easy going and can be affectionate. He gets along with some cats. If you are petting another cat, sometimes Kelly will shove in and demand his turn with you. We don't know how he gets along with dogs.

Sara is a medium size, adult, domestic short hair cat, with soft gray striping on a buff ground. Some might call her a blue tabby. She may even have some Russian Blue mixed in! After the woman taking care of Sara died, she was brought in by a volunteer of BCHS. She is about 4 years old. At first Sara was shy and hesitant around people and other cats, but now she is friendly and seeks attention and affection. But she is, on occasion, reluctant to be picked up or grabbed around her middle. Sara is front declawed.
